# From the Director

#### **One Question**

Undoubtedly, the most frequent question I've gotten over the last few months is "how many people attended the meeting in Atlanta?" Nearly four months have gone by and members are still talking about Atlanta. From the record-breaking attendance numbers to the engaging plenary sessions, the 2010 meeting continues to be a topic of conversation. To answer the question for everyone, here's the breakdown on the 2010 Annual Meeting attendance.

> 2460 total registrations 2209 registrants 251 spouses 222 exhibitors 2682 - total attendance

This was a 43% increase over 2009 and is the single highest attendance for any annual meeting. We had 575 scheduled presentations in 155 parallel sessions. With attendees from across the globe, the 2010 meeting was a prime example of ETS at its best—engaging, penetrating, irenic scholarship on Scripture, theology, and the church. Many thanks are due to Dr. Clinton Arnold, our 2010 program chair for his excellent work.

#### Key Membership Change

The most significant change in 2010 was the move from calendar to rolling-year

memberships. Now regardless of when you renew, your membership is valid for a full year. The website has been updated to accommodate this change and to make renewing even easier. As soon as you login, you can see your membership status and your expiration date in the *Account Status* box on the right side of the homepage. You can renew online up to three months ahead of your expiration. The system automatically shows you the renewal link as soon as you are eligible to renew.

If you haven't logged into the site recently, let me encourage you to do so soon. More than ever, the site is a key tool for Society members.

There are two sections of the *Newsletter* that are missing this year—*Member Publications* and *Members Seeking Employment*. Both of these features have been updated, expanded, and moved to our website. Members can now post their new publications online. # Biola University's Center for Christian Thought Fellowship Announcement

#### **Fellowship Description**

Biola University's Center for Christian Thought (CCT) will grant as many as eight one-semester Research Fellowships: four "external" fellowships (for scholars from institutions other than Biola University), three "internal" fellowships (for Biola University faculty), and potentially an additional post-doctoral fellowship. These Fellows will comprise an interdisciplinary group focused on the theme **Christian Scholarship in the 21st Century: Prospects and Perils**. Questions to be addressed include: What is Christian scholarship? Why is it important? What are its proper aims and methods? What challenges does it face? Whom does it serve and how? How does Christian scholarship contribute to a life of obedience to Jesus' love commands? Need it so contribute? Should Christian scholarship aim to influence culture? If so, how?

CCT Fellows will be in residence at Biola University from January 29, 2012 to May 19, 2012. Fellows will participate in a twoweek seminar at the start of the term led by visiting scholars Nicholas Wolterstorff and Alvin Plantinga, who will then return at the end of the term to interact with the Fellows' research in a two-day conference. For the remainder of the term, Fellows will meet weekly for round-table discussions of their research projects related to the theme. Each Fellow will have the opportunity to collaborate with CCT staff to communicate their research to both academic and non-academic audiences. Occasionally, the Fellows may be called upon to comment on the theme or related issues for various media outlets. There are no teaching or other requirements connected to the Fellowships. #### **Application Instructions:**

Applicants are asked to submit the following by May 15, 2011:

- Curriculum vitae
- Name and contact information of three references familiar with the applicants scholarly work
- A research proposal of no more than 1200 words describing the applicant's proposed project. Applicants should begin their proposal with a 150-word abstract summarizing their research. The body of the proposal should clearly state the connection of the research to the Center's theme, the significance of the research, the distinctive character of the argument advanced, and the methodology employed.

#### **Fellowship Eligibility**

Applicants must have a Ph.D. or equivalent terminal degree.

#### **Fellowship Benefits**

External Research Fellows will receive a \$25,000 stipend, office space, and a research assistant. The Post-Doctoral Fellow will receive a \$13,000 stipend, office space, and a research assistant. Funds will also be available to offset relocation expenses. Internal Research Fellows will each receive a course reduction of their teaching load and a research assistant.

Dr. D'Souza served in the Reagan White House, and was a fellow at the Hoover Institution at Stanford University. The New York Times Magazine named him one of America's most influential conservative thinkers. His bestseller *What's So Great About Christianity* has been favorably compared to the apologetic approach of C.S. Lewis.

Theological Dialogue within the Evangelical Community

The Southeastern region's annual meeting will be held Friday and Saturday, March 25-26, 2011. Hosted by Luther Rice Seminary, the event will be held at the First Baptist Church of Conyers in Conyers, GA.

The plenary speaker is Dr. Milliard Erickson. Dr. Erickson received his Ph.D. in systematic theology from Northwestern University, an MA in philosophy from the University of Chicago, a B.D. from Northern Baptist Theological Seminary, and a B.A. from the University of Minnesota.

Over the span of his long career in academics, Dr. Erickson taught at Wheaton College, Bethel Seminary (where he was dean the last eight years he was there), Southwestern Baptist Seminary, Western Seminary (Portland and San Jose), and Truett Seminary of Baylor University. Dr. Erickson is currently professor of theology at the Kairos Institute in Trinidad. He has also been visiting instructor in a number of places such as Sao Paulo, Guatemala City, and Budapest. In addition to his teaching duties, Dr. Erickson accepted full-time pastorates in Chicago and Minneapolis, and served in the capacity of interim pastor for 52 churches. He has written over 30 books of which his systematic theology, Christian Theology, is now entering its third edition.
