## RECENT REPRINTS

Baker Book House continues to publish valuable and often hard-to-find older commentaries in their "Thornapple Commentaries" series. Perhaps most noteworthy is A. H. McNeile's The Gospel According to St. Matthew (xxxvi + 448 pp., \$8.95), a dated (1915) but still helpful classic work. Westcott's commentary on the Greek text of John's gospel has appeared (1908, cxcv + 283, 394 pp., \$16.95), as well as Charles Hodge's theologically sensitive expositions of 1 Corinthians (1857; xxi + 373 pp., \$7.95) and 2 Corinthians (1859; 314 pp., \$7.95). It is good to see an addition to the meager number of available commentaries that deal with the Greek text of the Pastorals in J. H. Bernard's The Pastoral Epistles (1899; lxxviii + 192 pp., \$6.95). Comments on various Pauline texts (1-2 Thessalonians; 1 Corinthians 1-7; Romans 1-7; Eph 1:1-14) from the pen of the always stimulating J. B. Lightfoot are collected in Notes on Epistles of St. Paul (1895; ix + 336 pp., \$8.95). The Epistles of St. John by A. Plummer (1886; xcviii + 204 pp., \$7.95) completes the number of significant commentaries on the Greek text of NT books that we have received. In somewhat a different class, although in the same series, is the reprint of W. Maier's The Book of Nahum (386 pp., \$6.95), a recent work (1959).

No doubt as to who wrote Hebrews is left by the title of W. S. Plumer's 1872 Commentary on the Epistle of Paul, the Apostle, to the Hebrews (559 pp., \$9.95), also reprinted by Baker. The same publisher has also made available in paperback the late J. B. Payne's useful compendium, Encyclopedia of Biblical Prophecy (1973; xxiv + 754 pp., \$12.95); the important study by F. M. Cross, Jr., The Ancient Library of Qumran and Modern Biblical Studies (rev. ed., 1961; xxi + 260 pp., \$5.95); and W. Barclay's The King and the Kingdom (1968; 211 pp., \$3.95).

In their "Twin Brooks" series, Baker has reprinted several more theologically-oriented books. One of the better surveys of Calvin's theology is found in W. Niesel's *The Theology of Calvin* (a 1956 translation of the 1938 German ed.; 258 pp., \$6.95). Equally important are two other works: Westcott's *A General Survey of the History of the Canon of the New Testament* (6th ed., 1889; lvi + 593 pp., \$10.95) and the ground-breaking study of C. H. Dodd, *The Apostolic Preaching and Its Development* (1936; 96 pp., \$4.95). A series of lectures by F. J. A. Hort on *Judaistic Christianity* (1894; xii + 222 pp., \$5.95) provides dated though valuable material that favors the historical reliability of various NT books. Other works in this series are: J. H. Kurtz, *Sacrificial Worship of the Old Testament* (1863; 456 pp., \$8.95); Abraham Kuyper, *Principles of Sacred Theology* (1898; xxv + 683 pp., \$12.95); and C. F. H. Henry, *Aspects of Christian Social Ethics* (1964; 190 pp., \$5.95).

Finally, Zondervan has given us a paperback edition of Harold Hoehner's detailed and important study of *Herod Antipas* (Contemporary Evangelical Perspectives; 1972; xv + 437 pp., \$8.95).

All the above works are in paper and have 1980 reprint dates.
