

Memorial: ERIC EVANS JORDEN, 1914-1963

Dr. Eric Evans Jordan was born November 7, 1914, at Monmouth, England. He died on July 4, 1963, following an extended illness. He is survived by his wife, Gunnell, and two daughters, Marcia Jordan and Kathryn Nell Jordan. Ordained an elder of the Church of the Nazarene in 1941, he attended Northwest Nazarene College, where he graduated in 1944, and then took graduate work at the University of Southern California, where he received his Master's degree.

He served as pastor of the Church of the Nazarene at Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, Canada; Cypress, California; Lynnwood, California; and North Hollywood. He earned his Ph.D. in theology at the University of London, England, in 1957 while serving as pastor in that great city.

Dr. Jordan was a professor on the faculty at Azusa College in California, and later at Olivet Nazarene College in Kankakee, Illinois. He returned to his alma mater, Northwest Nazarene College, Nampa, Idaho, in 1959, where he served as chairman of the Division of Philosophy and Religion until his death.

Dr. Jordan was a member of College Church of the Nazarene, the American Association of University Professors, the Wesley Historical Society of England, the National Association of Biblical Instructors, the American Theological Society and the Evangelical Theological Society.

In addition to his ministry of teaching, Dr. Jordan was an effective expository preacher and was widely known for his pulpit ministry. At the peak of his preparation and powers, his passing is a loss keenly felt by his students and his denomination.

Memorial: DR. JAMES F. RAND, 1916-1963

Dr. James F. Rand, librarian of Dallas Theological Seminary and Graduate School of Theology, Dallas, Texas, died October 25 of a heart attack at the age of 47.

A graduate of Dallas Seminary with the Th.M. degree in 1949, Dr. Rand was appointed to the Faculty as librarian that same year. The outstanding event which marked the steady growth of the library under his direction was the construction of the \$400,000 Mosher Library building, which was dedicated in January, 1960.

Dr. Rand received the A.B. degree from Gordon College in 1945; the Th.D. degree from Dallas Seminary in 1954, and the S.M. in L.S. degree from Simmons College, Boston, in 1955.

Dr. Rand was ordained to the Christian ministry in the Blaney Memorial Baptist Church, Dorchester, Mass., his home church, in 1945. In Dallas he was a deacon in the Ridgecrest Baptist Church.

Dr. Rand was active in the American Association of Theological Librarians and a member of the Evangelical Theological Society.
